“Without SSP and my school, I wouldn’t have envisioned such a bright future for myself. I wouldn’t have the courage or the **ambition** to go as far as I have and hopefully even further.”

In middle school, Megan — a studious and shy young woman — was diagnosed with scoliosis. She wore a brace for a year before undergoing a spinal fusion operation, which required her to then wear a brace for another year. “I was made fun of and teased in school,” she recalled. “At first, I thought being a nerd or having scoliosis, those are things I should be ashamed of. Later on, I realized those things are my superpowers. That’s what is going to help me make a difference in the world.”

Megan, the youngest of three children to a single mother in the Bronx, followed in her oldest brother’s footsteps by applying to SSP and her middle sister’s by attending Preston High School. The tribulations she faced while applying to high school have shaped her goals and future ambitions.

Based on her experience, Megan decided early on that she wanted to become an orthopedic surgeon. She also dreams of writing a book based on her experiences. At Preston, with a scholarship from SSP, Megan found first-rate academics and a supportive community that encouraged her to pursue those dreams. “I like being in a school with an emphasis on certain customs or ideals, like kindness, compassion, and respect,” she said. “It’s contributed to my perspective of the world.”

Of the many opportunities afforded to her at Preston, Megan worked with her biology teacher to establish a new club, Young Leaders in Medicine. They’ve invited medical professionals, including an orthopedic surgeon, to share insights on entering the field. As a Hispanic woman, Megan hopes to enter a field where she will have few peers like her.

“That’s not something I see as an obstacle. It’s something I see as a motivator to be representation for both communities and to be someone that my future patients are comfortable with,” she said. “Being in an all-female school has really empowered me to not let social perceptions stop me and give me the skills to handle these perceptions on a day-to-day basis.”

In addition to the support of Preston, Megan has taken full advantage of the programs provided by SSP as she envisions college and her future career. She attended workshops that provided guidance on essay writing and other skills that will help her advance.

Megan was also selected as one of four Peter M. Flanigan Scholars for the Class of 2024, meaning she will be provided up to \$10,000 in supplemental funding for four years of college. “Since becoming a Flanigan Scholar, I’ve learned so much about the SSP community and what this organization stands for. I got to learn a lot about the founder. What he exemplifies is the thing I want to be. He was transformative and very versatile, and he obviously had a heart for philanthropy,” she said. “Hearing the stories of people who were once in my place and went through a lot of adversity but were still able to succeed has been really important to me, and it just makes me want to give back to the SSP community and be a part of this organization.”

If not for SSP and my mentor, Bill, I don't know where I'd be, and that's exactly what I want to give to Zaire. I'm proud to share insight, guidance, and most importantly, support for an incredible young person.

How much easier could my life have been if I had somebody there mentoring me? I wanted to share my personal growth and help **guide** young people through the transitions of life.

Kristine Liwag remembers well the hardship of first arriving in the United States from her native Philippines at the age of 11. “I really had a difficult time transitioning because my parents didn’t go to school in the US,” she recalled. “I was always looking for guidance — in high school, thinking about college, and then looking for jobs. I was fortunate to have found different mentors in my life to help me with these transitions.”

Those mentors seemed to have done their job well, as Kristine is now flourishing as Head of Aerospace & Defense Equity Research at Morgan Stanley. “I reached a point where I felt more established. I’ve had the career of my dreams, and I wanted to give back to the community,” she said.

That’s what brought Kristine to SSP. She signed up to mentor. As so often happens with twins, she expected one student and ended up with two. Sisters Lena and Lana are students at Cathedral High School. Three years into their relationship, Kristine has become more than a mentor.

“I really appreciate her. We do a lot of stuff together. She’s really close to us, and she helps our mom out a lot too. She even comes to our house,” Lena said. “She’s become a part of our family.”

Together, Kristine and the sisters spend time together regularly. They’ve attended the Rockettes Christmas Spectacular. They joined a special screening of *Wicked* with SSP. Kristine came to the sisters’ Sweet 16. The thing that Kristine says brings them together the most, though, is their meals together.

“Growing up, money was pretty tight for my family. Food was really more about sustenance, and we stuck to our traditional Filipino foods,” Kristine said. “Learning more about different cultures felt like such a luxury. Being able to try Thai or Vietnamese or Georgian food, these are things that when I was growing up we couldn’t really do. I thought that introducing the girls to different cultures and foods would be a great way to also learn about the world. Food is always a great bonding experience, and that’s something we’ve embarked on.”

Eating meals together has also allowed time for the three to talk about everything from school, tennis, college, career paths, and what kinds of lives Lena and Lana would like to lead in the future. “She’s definitely encouraged both of us to try new things and explore different opportunities,” Lana said. “We talk about what we want to do in the future and our dreams and our goals. She supports us to be our best selves.”

Following through on her commitment to give back, Kristine said that she has found her time as a mentor to be incredibly rewarding. “With high school students, you’re still there before they’ve chosen their path. You can really have an impact on where they go and how they think about their future,” she said. “I’m really excited to see what life path they choose to follow, and I’m excited to be there with them.”

I'm forever grateful to SSP. It meant everything to me. It's incredible that they are changing so many lives.

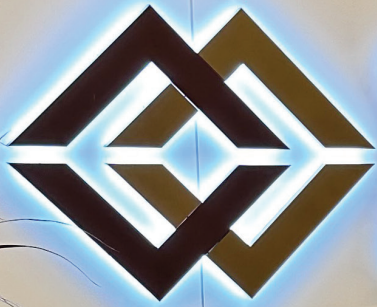

GIP is an organization that cares about people, and that’s what SSP is too. I think we’ve gotten a lot out of our **partnership**. We’re very proud of all SSP has achieved.

When Mark Levitt joined the Board of Directors in June 2023, he’d already been an integral part of the SSP community for more than a decade. “I was honored when (Executive Director) Debra (Vizzi) asked me to join the Board,” he said. “It’s been a great experience making people aware of SSP’s great work.”

Mark first became involved when a longtime member of our Board, Jim Healy, shared the work of SSP with him. The two had previously been colleagues at Credit Suisse. In 2013, Jim, who had recently founded Capra Ibex Advisors, reached out to Mark, who had since moved onto Global Infrastructure Partners (GIP), and suggested spreading the word about SSP there.

The two worked together to coordinate an info session for the team at GIP, an organization driven to grow its philanthropic footprint. After that first meeting, Mark decided to sponsor a student himself, and GIP and its Chair and Managing Partner Adebayo Ogunlesi joined by making matching gifts to sponsor more than 10 students.

From there, the partnership between GIP and SSP — and the number of people from GIP who have invested time, money, and resources into our students — has grown exponentially.

In the 2022-2023 school year alone, GIP as an organization sponsored 55 SSP students, while individual employees sponsored 11 more and 12 served as mentors. Over the past decade, 32 members of the GIP team have personally supported SSP as sponsors, mentors, and donors.

GIP and their employees had contributed more than \$1.3 million to SSP’s work by the end of Fiscal Year 2023 with commitments to continue giving.

GIP’s impact goes well beyond those gifts. In addition to individual mentorships, GIP has organized regular workshops and webinars to inform and inspire SSP students.

As a leading infrastructure fund management company, GIP team members are able to provide insights on various opportunities for our students. “The best thing you can do for a kid is make them aware of career paths they might not be aware of, may not think about, or may not think are attainable,” Mark said.

GIP has also invited SSP students to social activities to have new experiences and make connections, most recently a Knicks games in March 2023. “It was great for my team to meet the students. It brings it to life,” he said.

Mark and his colleagues share a sense of pride in their collective impact and the personal connections they’ve made with students. “I’ve really enjoyed the time I’ve spent with the students that I’ve sponsored,” Mark said. “I always say I’m as proud of them as I would be of one of my own children.”

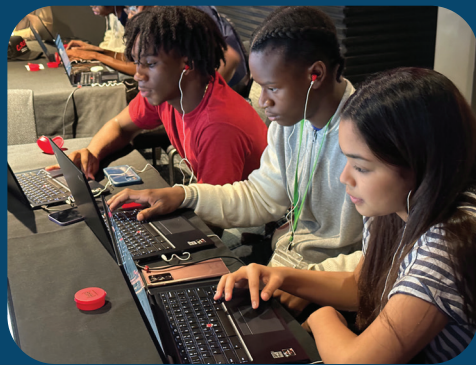

Robert Spencer nearly flunked out of junior high school.

He repeated the eighth grade and was on the fast track to trouble.

Now 18, the Bronx youth graduated with honors from Cardinal Hayes High School over the weekend. In September, he will attend Duke University.

Spencer is one of 198 city kids graduating from a private school this month, thanks to the Student/Sponsor Partnership, a nonprofit organization that links disadvantaged students with mentors who pay for private school and serve as role models.

"This is a dream come true," he said. "I was a good student in grammar school, but in junior high ... something happened. I knew I could do the work, but I didn't want to. I am

on the right track now." According to school officials, Spencer became an A student once he was enrolled in Cardinal Hayes. He graduated third in his class.

Spencer said he owes it all to his sponsor, Brian Burke, who also helped him find a job on Wall Street after school and summers and gave him a lot of practical advice.

"Brian has taken a real interest in me," said Spencer. "He exposed me to a lot of people and places that were not a part of my world ... he gave me the push I needed."

Sponsors like Donna Zacarro and her husband, Paul Ullman, who have been involved with the program for the past eight years, say there's no greater joy than to help someone.

"We wanted to do more than just write a check," Zacarro said. "We are providing these kids with the kind of educa-

tion they would not have gotten otherwise."

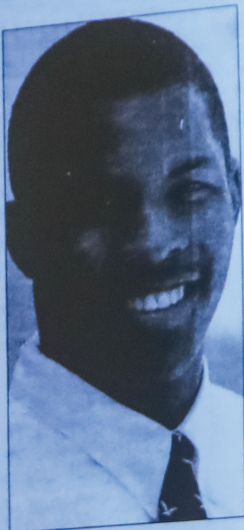
Founded by Manhattan investment banker Peter Flanigan 10 years ago, the program has grown from serving 45 students to 1,015.

Student Wilson Mendez was sponsored by Zacarro and Ullman. They attended his graduation from Manhattan's LaSalle Academy on Thursday and an awards banquet the night before. Mendez will attend Marist College and plans to major in computer science.

"They are like second parents to me," Mendez said of his sponsors. "They encouraged me to study hard ... Now, I am going to make them proud of me."

Mendez and Spencer said they hope to rejoin the Student/Sponsor Partnership in a couple of years — as sponsors.

"I want to be able to help someone one day, too," Spencer said.

It's a proud moment for me to see someone's growth. To see the impact of how you change someone's life for the better, it brings us **purpose.**

Throughout her life, Nicole Leuth recalls her family's commitment to giving back. As she grew up in North Carolina, her family would volunteer at food banks and give to local causes. As young dancers, Nicole and her sister organized dance classes for young people with special needs.

As Nicole was finishing up college at the University of South Carolina and starting her career, her father, Charles "Chuck" Leuth, was ending his. He had started his own business, PolySi Technologies, Inc., and found a good deal of success in the special-application industrial lubricant industry. After 25 years, Chuck sold the business in 2020 and decided to continue the tradition of giving back he instilled in his three children.

From the family's generous spirit, the North Carolina Empowering Kids & Communities Foundation (NCEKCF) was born. Chuck serves as President of the Board while Nicole serves as Executive Director, balancing her philanthropic endeavors with a career in supply chain with IBM.

The family's commitment to education started in North Carolina, where Nicole lived after college. Nicole began tutoring a local high school student and soon started meeting virtually with both her and her younger sister. That experience launched a commitment not only to education but to mentorship. "You could really see the impact," Nicole recalled. "I was tutoring them, but it was really more mentorship. I was there to hold them accountable and cheer them on. We really saw the importance of having someone there for them."

In 2022, Nicole moved to New York City, and she brought that commitment with her. "We think it's really important to impact the communities that you live in," she said. "We still work with people in North Carolina, but when I moved here, I wanted to work with some New York organizations."

In looking for local nonprofits to support, Nicole found SSP, and today we are proud to be one of seven organizations to partner with NCEKCF. "I think the intertwining of mentorship and education is extremely important. I really like that SSP does both. I think it's really important to have a comprehensive program," Nicole said. "I also think it's really great that SSP is so established. You can really see how the program is impacting the students and the community at large."

NCEKCF launched our partnership by sponsoring six students in the Class of 2027. Immediately seeing the impact of that investment and working closely with the SSP team, they signed up to sponsor four more in the Class of 2028. "The tangibility of seeing their grades, their progress, and hearing from the SSP team about how they're adjusting any areas where they're falling behind — it shows how structured and effective the SSP program is," Nicole said. "From our first cohort, we have already seen a lot of students get a higher GPA than they came into high school with. Being able to see that play out has been impactful for us."

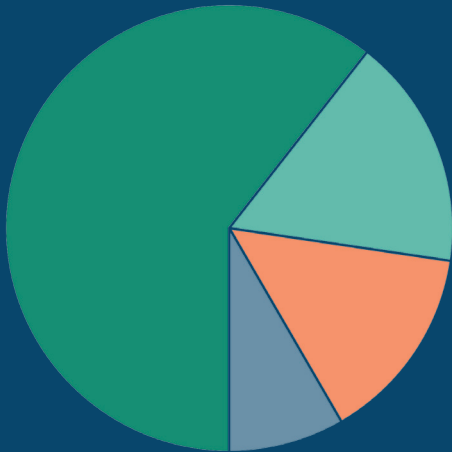

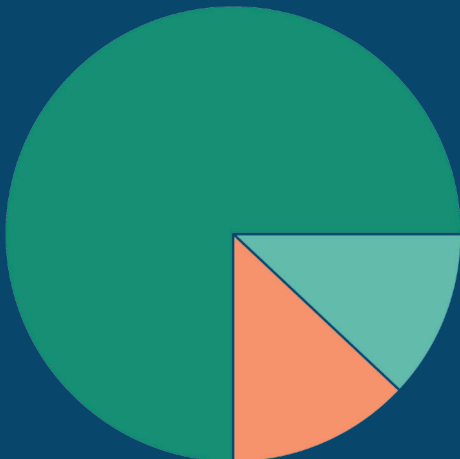

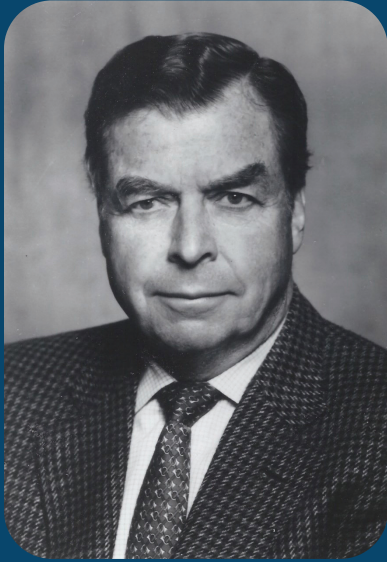
